Is there life after death?

• Where do we come from?

There is always the need to go deeper there is so much we can't be expected to see


### A CHALLENGE: BUILDING BRIDGES BETWEEN THESE WORLDS

- The scriptures come from a world that is not our own and sometimes we find it hard to connect what is going on in our lives with what is happening in the readings.
- We need to build bridges between our worlds.



### CONTEXTS CHANGE - YOU CAN'T ALWAYS APPLY IT THE SAME WAY

- Care needs to be taken because the Word is human and divine - you can't take everything as having the same value.
- Leviticus 25:44 states that I may possess slaves, both male and female, provided they are purchased from neighboring nations.
- A friend of mine claims that this applies to Mexicans, but not Canadians. Can you clarify? Why can't I own a Canadian?



 Lev. 21:20 states that I may not approach the altar of God if I have a defect in my sight. I have to admit that I wear reading glasses.
Does my vision have to be 20/20, or is there some wiggle-room here?

### IT BECOMES AT TIMES A BALANCING ACT

 That Jesus is truly divine and truly human is to state the challenge as much as it is to provide the answer to the question " Who is Jesus?"

If it is true of Jesus the "word of God" how much more the scriptures themselves?

### WE CAN FIND OURSELVES IN THESE STORIES

Ultimately, when we say the scriptures are inspired we assert that their meaning and value goes beyond the times and places in which they were written.

This is another way of saying that the scriptures have something to say to us here and now as a moral compass, or a source of encouragement and challenge.

# WE CAN SEE OURSELVES IN THE SCRIPTURES

- There are stories of finding and losing, loving and hating, of exile and return, of traveling to new lands of hope and promise, of building in hope and watching dreams being torn down. Faith, hope, and love compete with despair, cynicism, and grief.
- There are stories of families divided, promises made and broken, looking for a place to belong, getting caught up in competition and jealousy, politics, betrayal, national fervour and ambition.

#### MATTHEW'S VIEW OF THE CHURCH

 Like Jesus' genealogy Matthew's community, and the Church in any age, is made up of saints and sinners, weeds and wheat (Matt 13:24-30) capable of courage and deceit, faith and failure, whose love can run cold (Matt 24:12) but who can rejoice because they have been invited into the mystery of the Kingdom (Matt 13:11). They have found the pearl of great price (Matt 13:46) but will they use the talents they have been given (Matt 25:24-25) or will they be seduced by arguing about who is the greatest (Matt 18:4), or fail to see the invitation to move on because the mission to the world beckons (Matt 17:4)?

 For Matthew Jesus is the answer to our deepest needs. In the midst of our bruised and fragile humanity, and well aware of Israel's own chequered history, Matthew is convinced that humanity can start again, but that we need a new map to guide us.

 Jesus provides that map and it requires an attitude of openness to the values of the beatitudes, and the parables of the Kingdom.
